Faculty Spotlight — Dr. Varun Goel

Dr. Varun Goel is a first year Assistant Professor in the Department. As a medical and health geographer, Varun studies the spatial distribution of disease and health disparities around the globe.



Varun holds a PhD in geography from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and is a member of the AAG's Health and Medical Geography Specialty Group. During the COVID-19 pandemic, Varun, with the help of others, created a geospatial application to identify people who needed assistance carrying out basic tasks. For example, elderly people needing help getting groceries could use the app to connect with people who were potentially able to help. This summer, Varun is looking forward to a project in Tanzania

Alumni Spotlight — Dr. Benjamin Haywood

Dr. Benjamin Haywood earned his PhD from the department in 2014. He has served in many administrative and faculty roles since, most recently as the Director of Community Science at the National Audubon Society, where he leads the society's flagship community science initiatives including the Climate Watch and Great Backyard Bird Count programs. He is also an active member of the Association for Advancing Participatory Sciences (AAPS) and the Professional and Organizational Development Network (POD). He has created lasting programs such as launching bird banding stations, equity-focused STEM initiatives, and community science networks. In his role as an educator and mentor, he uses his personal experience, knowledge and voice to advocate for LGBTQ+ inclusion in STEM fields. His recent fieldwork includes blending the social and natural sciences to explore

how people engage with science in informal settings and how that engagement can inspire action-based conversations. He is also exploring field experiments to expand community science engagement in Latin America, with a focus on identifying both motivations and barriers to participation.
