DISCUSSION: PARTICIPANT COMPENSATION

At the March Community Advisory Board meeting (meet CAB on Page 5), we had a fascinating conversation on participant compensation. Here are some take-aways:

- **Consider other forms of compensation.** Think beyond financial incentives / payments. Other ideas included: childcare / respite nights, zoo tickets, toy/prize bin.
- **Opportunities for choice.** This was another common theme. Can participants participate on certain procedures but not others (i.e., opt out from bloodwork)?
- **Identify the barriers and make sure to compensate appropriately.** These will likely vary per population. For instance, if compensating for travel, is that all travel (home-school-lab/clinic-home)?
- **Provide needed resources.** Incentives might include locally curated resource guide.

Meet Our Community Advisory Board (CAB)

The CAN CAB is a group of community members who meet with our researchers, with the goal of gathering input about the alignment of our research and community outreach activities with the needs and values of the community.



Anja Wilson is a Special Education Advocate/IEP Consultant. She is also a single parent to her son Cortland, who was diagnosed with Autism Spectrum Disorder at the age of three. An alumna of the University of Tennessee, her passion for advocating for autism was born from Cortland's journey. This passion is built on a foundation of advocacy, where she aims to be a powerful and strong voice for those who cannot advocate for themselves by promoting the embodiment of advocacy, empowerment, education, commitment, and community.

Brianna Ash is a person with disabilities, social worker, and disability advocate. She graduated with her Master of Social Work (MSW) in 2021 from the University of South Carolina.



Camerun Washington is a certified genetic counselor. He has worked with hundreds of families navigating the genetic testing process for autism and other neurodevelopmental disorders. He is currently pursuing a fellowship in community engagement and outreach education with the American Society of Human Genetics and National Human Genome Research Institute.

Dallas Nicholson is a mental health therapist at Moonbug Therapy, in which she uses an ecological systems perspectives and has experience working with children and families.



Kamania Wynter-Hoyte is an Associate Professor of Early Childhood Education at USC and has a son who is autistic.

Kris Beard is a stay-at-home mother of two children, one of whom is autistic with high support needs. Before starting her family and journey into neurodiversity support and advocacy, she was a researcher and college instructor at Clemson and earned her PhD in Genetics in 2014.



Nikki Happe is the Early Intervention Services Director at Epworth Early Intervention Center where she oversees the home-based program and their early intervention preschool program. She serves on the Safe Babies Court Active Community Team and is passionate about connecting families to local resources.

Stephanie Turner is the Autism Division Director of the South Carolina Department of Disabilities and Special Needs (DDSN). She has worked in Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) therapy, and she is personally connected to neurodevelopment through her sister-in-law, who was diagnosed with autism as an adult.

- Do you have materials the CAB will need to review to prepare for your presentation? Sydney will need them **AT LEAST** one week in advance.
- CAB members include self-advocates, caregivers and family members, and service providers.

FULL PANEL REVIEW

Occasionally, we will host a full **"mock" grant review** in which senior CAN members will review, score, and discuss an application (e.g., Aims + Research Strategy). Early career scientists will be prioritized. Advanced notice is required to schedule but application is not required until closer to review date. Contact [Caitlin](#) if you are interested.
