Meet Professor Oswaldo Estrada, an accomplished academic at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. As a professor of Spanish and Latin American Studies, director of the Faculty Fellows Program, and editor of *Hispanófila* and *Palabras de América*, he is also involved in the university's Institute for the Arts and Humanities. Dr. Estrada is also a prolific author and editor of numerous books on literary and cultural criticism, including the award-winning *Troubled Memories: Iconic Mexican Women and the Traps of Representation* (2019 CHOICE Outstanding Academic Title).

This presentation focuses on Francisca Pizarro, daughter of the Spanish conquistador Francisco Pizarro and the Inca princess, Quispe Sisa. Prof. Estrada analyzes contemporary rewritings of Francisca, and how they speak of otherness, gender challenges, and coloniality in the 21st Century.
